# THE VOTE, YOUR POWER, USE IT! By Selena Barron

This is the centennial of the ratification of the 19th Amendment that "gave" women the right to vote. In another first, in Central Park, sculptor Meredith Berman unveiled a bronze sculpture, the new Women's Rights Pioneer Monument. The sculpture depicts Sojourner Truth, Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton all activists in the national suffrage movement. It is the first statue in Central Park to depict real

women. What would the three women have said about this monument celebrating their achievement? Most likely they would have been thankful at the acknowledgement of the fight for the vote for women that took over 70 years. However, they would certainly think that a better way to honor them would be for all eligible women to use the power they now have and **VOTE!** 

Women do vote in higher numbers than men. In 2016 9.9 million more women than men voted; 63.3% of eligible female adults voted compared to 59.3% of eligible male adults. More women registered to vote 83.8 million compared to 73.8 million men. That means women outnumber men by 10 million eligible voters. What power! Use it! We can do much better than a 63.3% turnout of women voters. **Make a plan and vote.**

## SPEAKER: DIANA LENNON, HEAD OF ADULT SERVICES, OSSINING PUBLIC LIBRARY



# VOTE: BE PREPARED, KNOW THE ISSUES, BE INFORMED -by Selena Barron

Recently AAUW-NYS sent out an email stating that they are committed to open and fair elections, nonpartisan voter education efforts that will promote equitable political participation and representation in appointed and elected office and the expansion of voting rights. We hope that the information included in a poll by the Pew Research Center will be a resource and information for beginning conversations about the 2020 presidential election.



Between July 27 and August 2, 2020 the Pew Research Center conducted a poll of U.S adult, registered voters to learn which of 12 issues they considered the most important. The poll is broken down into two parts. The first part is based on overall results The second part separates the results based on the inputs from Trump supporters and Biden supporters

With the country suffering from an economic crisis, it is understandable that overall the economy was the number one issue voters said was very important to them in deciding for which candidate they would vote. Trump supporters chose the economy and violent crime as their top issues, followed by immigration, gun policy and foreign policy. For Biden supporters, health care and the coronavirus outbreak are top issues, followed by racial and ethnic inequality and climate control.

On the 100th anniversary of women successfully fighting for the right to vote, make sure your ballot reflects your own study of the information and resources that are available. How would you rank the twelve issues? Would you delete any issue or add one of your own?
