



SPEAKER: Reverend Dorothy Muller, Presbyterian Minister and volunteer chaplain at Bedford Hill Correctional Facility

PROGRAM: The Abuse to Prison Pipeline for Women

Women in prison in the United States share two experiences in overwhelming numbers: poverty and a history of abuse. Rev. Dorothy Muller will talk about the physical and societal implications of these experiences; how they lead to prison sentences; and possibilities for altering this path. She has many insights to share from her ten years as a volunteer chaplain at Bedford Hills Correctional Facility.



After careers in teaching (mathematics) and business (IT consulting; change management), in the fall of 2006, Dorothy audited a class at Union Theological Seminary in New York City. She went on to study there half-time and to start half-time volunteer work as a chaplain at Bedford Hills Correctional Facility, New York's only maximum security women's prison. In 2013, she helped start Woman 2 Woman, a prison visiting program that matches local women with inmates at Bedford and

Taconic prisons. Dorothy earned a M.Div. from Union in 2012 and was ordained a Presbyterian minister in 2015. Her other degrees are a B.A. from Vassar in 1970 (Mathematics) and an M.Ed. from Boston University in 1977 (Counseling). She is married with two adult children and one (brand new!) grandchild.

- Westchester Women's Agenda I am participating in the Female Empowerment in the Workplace Strategic Plan Working Group. I will keep you informed.

THE "SHE-CESSION" -by Selena Barron

AAUW has always been a strong advocate for equal opportunity and equal pay for all women and girls. However, the current pandemic makes our current support more essential and important than ever.

In September, 865,000 women dropped out of the labor force, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, September jobs report. In the same period, just 216,000 men exited the workforce. A study by McKInsey & CO. and Lean In stated that one in four women are considering reducing work hours, taking part time positions, switching to less demanding jobs, taking leaves of absence, or leaving the workforce completely. The alarming statistics have led to calling the loss of women in the workforce a 'she-cession'.

Part of this loss of women in the workforce is due to the type of sector in which they are employed. Women make up the majority of the workforce in fields such as retail, hospitality, restaurants, teaching, public sector, elder care and childcare, that have all been hardest hit by COVID-19, social distancing, and shutdowns. Starting in September public sector job loss began, resulting in many teachers and government workers becoming unemployed.

The Bipartisan Policy center found that more than 70% of parents of children under the age of 5 report that their child care provider is closed or has limited hours or space. Lack of child care affects women more than men. Latest studies show that more women than men have reduced their work hours, or left work to care for their children. Mothers have arranged reductions in their work hours four or five times more than reductions arranged by fathers. The disparity in reductions has resulted in more than double the gap in the number of hours worked by men and women. Misty L. Heggeness, an economist at the U.S.Census Bureau said "The impact on short term work productivity and engagement appears to be borne entirely on the backs of mothers of school age children. Women who stop participating in the workforce, will probably impact their own professional and financial goals for the rest of their lives.

Adding to the problem is the lack of U.S. policy on the federal level .Our country doesn't guarantee paid parental leave and does not require all companies to provide sick leave. Universal childcare and preschool are also not priorities

Women are not the only ones who will suffer. A nineteen year study of 215 companies done by Pepperdine University found a strong correlation between having women executives and profitability, resulting in 18-69% boosts for the Fortune 500 firms who have the best records for promoting women.

AAUW must continue to fight for equal opportunity and equal pay for women. In addition we must support policy changes at the federal level so women don't lose the progress we've already made..

SPRING Community Partners has been an effective community organization providing programs, assistance and resources to families and children most in need in the Village of Dobbs Ferry. Since its inception, SPRING has grown from serving 20 families to 120 families and counting. SPRING has a committed and fully engaged Board of Directors that includes a number of local educators, community leaders and resource experts.

SPRING's primary programs and activities include: food support, co-direction of the Dobbs Ferry Food Pantry, school supplies, preschool placement, after school and summer programming, academic assistance, parent support, musical instrument rentals, sports fees, social services referrals and crisis intervention.

The Dobbs Ferry Food Pantry opened its doors in January 2011 at the request of SPRING Community Partners, and in cooperation with the South Presbyterian Church of Greenburgh. In 2013, weekly distribution of shelf-stable food and fresh produce began in response to growing local food insecurity in the villages of Dobbs Ferry, Ardsley, Irvington and the town of Greenburgh. In 2020, the COVID-19



pandemic caused the Food Pantry to increase its operations over 300%, from serving an average of 40 families, 120 people to over 130 families, 500 people. Such rapid growth and long term implications of the pandemic are expected to continue for the foreseeable future, as the Pantry tries to keep its traditions of carefully selected food and produce, grocery card assistance, and personalized attention to the families it serves.
