

ANOTHER FIRST! -by Selena Barron

The American Association of University Women (AAUW) advances gender equity through research, education and advocacy. Our nonpartisan, nonprofit organization has more than 170,000 members and supporters across the United States, as well as 1,000 local branches and more than 800 college and university members.

On April 7th AAUW Chief Executive Officer Gloria L. Blackwell issued the following statement on the confirmation of another first for women supported by AAUW.

"We witnessed a historic and momentous occasion today when, in a bipartisan vote, the U.S. Senate confirmed Ketanji Brown Jackson as associate justice to the Supreme Court of the United States. As the first Black woman in this esteemed

role, she will add to the breadth of insights, perspectives and life experiences on the bench—and our nation and our system of justice will be better for it. Congratulations to the soon-to-be Justice Jackson, and thank you to all the U.S. Senators who voted to confirm her."

This moment marks another major step forward for women, and the American Association of University Women is proud to have been part of that progress. Over the course of our 140-year history, our activism and advocacy have contributed to the achievement of many firsts.

We stood strong when Sandra Day O'Connor became the first woman Supreme Court justice; when Nancy Pelosi was elected Speaker of the House of Representatives; when Hillary Clinton ran for president as the first woman nominee of a major U.S. political party; and when Kamala Harris was elected vice president, to name just a few. These women's accomplishments may now seem commonplace, but we must never forget the hard work and sacrifice it took to break new ground. And now Judge Jackson's confirmation by the U.S. Senate is a landmark achievement for gender and racial equity.

It should go without saying that Judge Ketanji Brown Jackson has the intelligence, the integrity, the legal acumen and the sound judicial temperament that make her exceptionally qualified for a seat on the highest court in the land. But just for the record, we'll say it again. Throughout the challenging hearings of the past month—during which she responded to more than 20 hours of questioning, submitted more than 1,500 written responses to the committee and offered every Senator the opportunity to meet in person—she displayed an unparalleled level of leadership, patience and grace.

Judge Jackson proved to the nation that her credentials are exceptional, her character is unimpeachable and her dedication to the rule of law and the U.S. Constitution, unwavering. With great joy and enormous pride, we look forward to the imprint she will make on the court and on our country.

As a member of our AAUW branch, you can be proud that you are a woman successfully advocating for gender equity for women! !


GREATER ACCESS TO AAUW WESTCHESTER'S MONTHLY SPEAKERS' PROGRAM

ADVOCACY NEWS – APRIL-MAY 2022 by Jane Pendergast

Did the Governor's budget play well to advocates? The campaign by organizations within the POWHER-NY coalition and other groups statewide to significantly increase state funding for home care and childcare saw measured increases in the Governor's budget. The



increased funding is welcome, but it was not sufficient to provide broadly affordable childcare, to bring caregivers' pay high enough to attract workers and build the profession, and thus to promote women's return to work. Yet the governor's office has strongly encouraged POWHER advocates to continue collaborating with them to pursue their mutual goals. Regarding the new childcare benefits, they will be available to both working parents and parents in school, but undocumented children will not.

On a related note, the budget includes some healthcare benefits for undocumented residents over 65, but it pulled back existing coverage for certain undocumented residents. The *Coverage for All* campaign, supported by a number of Westchester women's organizations, would have expanded healthcare coverage to undocumented residents, did not gain support in the budget.

On issues beyond the budget, the state bill on pay transparency is progressing through the chambers, and POWHER understands it has a good chance of passing in this session. However, the NYC pay transparency legislation passed in January faces amendments supported by Council leaders, which POWHER-NY opposes. These changes would exempt employers with 15 or fewer employees from listing salary ranges instead of the currently 4 or fewer employees, which is the standard for the NYC Human Rights Law, exempt all jobs that could be done remotely, in whole or in part, create a giant loophole for employers to place a general "Help Wanted" job posting without having to reveal salary information, postpone the start date for the law which is scheduled to go into effect on May 15, 2022. THE HISTORIAN: 1960- 1961 THE BIRTH OF THE 1960'S CULTURAL REVOLUTION Submitted by Elaine Weiss, Branch Historian

On May 9, 1960 the Food and Drug Administration approved the first oral contraceptive, commonly known as "the pill," for sale as birth control in the United States. The conflict over a personal right for women that fills our press today led to private individual freedom for women.

November 1961: Women Strike for Peace, founded by Bella Abzug and Dagmar Wilson, drew 50,000 women nationwide to protest nuclear weapons and U.S. involvement in war in southeast Asia.

December: 1961: President John F. Kennedy issued an executive order establishing the President's Commission on the Status of Women. He appointed former First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt to chair the commission.

The year 1961 continued the active role of AAUW. Mt. Kisco member activities included art studies, music, theater and literature group. Another group was International Relations. Dr. Maurice Hennessy, a former British diplomat and journalist, spoke about the Belgian Congo.

Some Mt. Kisco members were also involved in a Tuesday and Thursday program called "School Yourself." All AAUW Members were invited to a reception for U.N. guests at the Chappaqua PTA Art Fair. The AAUW supported local school programs and became involved in projects to improve the quality of education.

GIRLS FOR STEM YOUNG SCIENTIST SYMPOSIUM By Susan Appel

We are very excited to introduce our first Young Scientist Symposium at our Girls For STEM event, which was held at the College of Mt. St. Vincent on April 30. Our speakers were high school seniors from Westchester and New York City, who have already made impacts in STEM fields and won awards at the Regeneron Science Talent Search (STS). Two of them, Aliya Fisher and Anika Puri, were the first two high school students to present workshops at one of our earlier Explore Your Opportunities conferences.

The high school seniors that presented workshops this year were the following:

- Aliya Fisher, from the Bronx High School of Science, was a member of the STRIDES group, which taught seventh grade girls how to make and use inexpensive foldable microscopes. For her STS project, she investigated circadian clocks in the fruit fly *Drosophila melanogaster*.
- Anika Puri, from Chappaqua High School, enabled the girls to create art using Artificial Intelligence. Her STS project also included Artificial Intelligence, with which she created a realtime wildlife-poaching detector.
- Victoria Li, from Hunter College High School, did a computational biology and informatics project, exploring CRISPR-Cas 9 gene editing.
- Nyasha Nyomi, from Ossining High School, did a behavioral and social science project on a topic that wouldn't be expected in a science project. She found that Instagram influencers endorsed more unhealthy food and beverage products compared to celebrities.

When they became semifinalists, \$2,000 was given to each young woman and her school. In addition, Victoria and Nyasha were among the forty finalists, and each received an additional \$25,000.
