
Enthusiasm is high for our annual STEM conference for 7th and 8th graders. For the last two years we have had Girls for STEM *virtually* with the help of the College of Mount Saint Vincent. The students who attended did their workshops at home, with material we sent them and guided by great workshop leaders. For the last 20 years AAUW in Westchester and New York City have successfully had girls attending our STEM program. Our program has given girls the opportunities to see first-hand what opportunities are available to them. As sponsors we have co-hosted our conference with Barnard College, Columbia University, and for the last 13 years with the College of Mount Saint Vincent. The program has grown from STEM workshops for the girls taught by women in the fields of Science Technology, Engineering and Mathematics to include workshops for parents and teachers. This year the adults will be given the opportunity to understand the role they play in getting their girls to be prepared for these fields. We will also have our traditional challenge to meet the Mystery Women. Who are these successful women and how did they get into STEM positions?

We are particularly excited this year because so many of the members of Westchester AAUW and

Empire New York State branches have volunteered to make this the best conference ever. They have found exciting workshop leaders and Mystery Woman to present at the conference. We are taking every precaution to make this in-person conference safe for all. This year some of the workshops include "Make your own website", "Liquid Candy" and "Brain Games".

The conference will be held on the campus of the College of Mount Saint Vincent on March 4, 2023 from 8:30 AM to 12:30PM. Each student will attend two workshops. AAUW FUNDS FOR GRADUATE STUDY FOR WOMEN

Since 1888 AAUW has been one of the largest funding resources for women seeking to further their education at the graduate level. From astronauts to zoologists the recipients of AAUW's fellowships, grants and awards represent nearly every field of endeavor. In the 2022-2023 award year AAUW is providing \$6 million in funding to more than 320 applicants.

For more than 130 years, AAUW has funded the education of countless women so they could follow their dreams. The funds have awarded more than \$135 million to over 13,000 women and nonprofit organizations around the world. The recipients include some of the most influential voices of the past two centuries. They are women who have helped shape history and have supported nonprofit organizations that are at the forefront of bringing about social change.

The funds were initiated after the Civil War when a growing middle class made it possible for women to attend college. AAUW founder Marion Talbot and member Christine Ladd Franklin gave a shout out to AAUW members to support a fund for women's graduate education. Their goal was to "enable gifted women to use their intellectual power for the good of humanity." They asked each AAUW member to contribute one dollar per year. In 1888 the first fellowship went to Ida Street, a pioneer in the field of early American Indian history. The amount was \$350. The International Fellowship Program has funded women from more than 150 nations. Its goal is to support women to become professors, administrators, deans or college presidents.

In 1920 AAUW supported Madame Marie Curie by raising \$100,000 for her purchase of a gram of radium for her research. The fundraising was so successful they ended with \$56,000 over the required amount. During World War II, AAUW helped Jewish scholar Lise Meitner escape from Europe. In the U.S. Ms. Meitner became a visiting physics professor at Catholic University. In the 1950s AAUW funded author Susan Sontag and psychologist Dr. Joyce Brothers. In 1963 AAUW expanded its fellowship and grant program. In collaboration with the U.S, Department of State, it developed the African Educator's Program, which brought African teachers from newly independent African nations to America to study in U.S. Colleges.

In the 1970's AAUW published a report, "Where do Women Stand". Women were demanding their rights and equality. AAUW created research and project grants that allowed women to re-enter the workforce and to give them the skills they needed to be competitive. The Program was called "Selected Professions Fellowships".

During the Civil Rights movement AAUW members raised \$150,000 to create a fund in honor of Coretta Scott King that would support African American women who would study African-American culture, civil rights and peace. Ms. King wrote a letter to AAUW members stating in part "I am deeply greatful to the American Association of University Women for establishing this scholarship fund. There is entirely too little research, writing and understanding of non-violence, peace and Afro-American history." There were 46 outstanding recipients of the fund. Nell Irvin Painter stands out! She is a leading U.S. historian and the Edwards Professor Emerita of American History at Princeton University. She received her AAUW award in1970 while completing her doctorate in American studies at Harvard University. She has honorary doctorates from Wesleyan College, Dartmouth University, Yale University, and the State University of New York, in New Paltz. She has received fellowships from the Guggenheim Foundation, the National Endowment for the Humanities, the American Council of Learned Studies, and the American Antiquarian Society.

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engineer, biomedical engineer, software engineer, and a pilot, became the second female astronaut. When she died in the 1986 Challenger tragedy AAUW members raised \$235,000 to fund the Judith Resnik American Fellowship Endowment.

In the 21st century recipients include news commentator Melissa Harris Percy, an AAUW 2001-2002 American Fellow, Tererai Trent a 2001-2002 International Fellow and 2017 Alumnae Recognition Awardee, and Rachael Rollins, the 1996-1997 AAUW Selected Professions Fellow who became the first woman elected district attorney in Boston, Mass. Claudine Gay will become the next president of Harvard University in July 2023. She is the first black person to hold that position. She is a 2003-2004 AAUW American Fellow. Currently she is the first woman and first African American dean of the Faculty of Arts and Science at Harvard University. Gay also is the founding chair of Harvard's Inequality in America Initiative.

As described above, the AAUW grants, fellowships and awards have benefited a very wide spectrum of social issues for women's rights, civil rights and racial equality. In her 1969 AAUW National Convention Address, King advised members to remember "the enormous influence that an organization like the American Association of University Women, through its educated women ... can exert." We hold on to these words as we continue our fight for women's empowerment in the coming year and beyond.
