She has been in this role for over four years where she spends time educating activists, collaborating with community partners and engaging youth in the reproductive rights movement. She has a Masters in Public Policy from Stony Brook University.





THE HISTORIAN 1963-1964: A BIRTH OF CHANGE Submitted by Elaine Weiss, Branch Historian

Between 1957 and 1963, more than 10,000 babies in the United States were born with physical abnormalities caused by the drug thalidomide. Out of this came stricter regulations for approving new drugs and vaccines that remain in effect to this day. This tragedy led to an open and passionate fight for the right to abortion. The travels to other nations was reported by the national news stations. The AAUW's search for change rose with a new generation. Our Branch of AAUW responded to the early women's cultural revolution.



In March 1963, the Westchester AAUW had an International Relations group working with the "Home Demonstration Department of the Westchester County Extension Service". AAUW members were encouraged to attend. In 1963 there were three Study Groups International Relations, Contemporary Issues and Contemporary Literature. The October meeting Program included "The New Math: A Sample Lesson". The Contemporary literature group discussed James Baldwin's The Fire Next Time. The fire was alive in the Civil rights movement. Equal pay legislation passed in 1963. The legislation failed to solve the problem of low paying jobs that were still was passed as 'female'.

Fall 1963 and Spring 1964 were times of serious cultural impact. such as the assassination of JFK in November 1963. The winter and spring of 1964 led to an increase of AAUW membership. During March 1964 the Drama Group ordered Dylan tickets! They had a guest from the U.N. Secretariat on May 2nd. The March 1964 Chips noted the first Science Field Trip, of about 25 members, had toured IBM's Watson Research Center on January 7th.

There was a New York State Convention from May 14-16. Meetings and workshops filled the time including the AAUW of New York telegram to President Johnson informing him of our complete support of the civil rights legislation being debated in the Senate. On June 21 President Johnson signed the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

These events begin to turn us into a nation of progress. Women, who had fought for equality earlier now were supported by many pieces of legislation and decisions of the Supreme Court that created rights for women. There were work and voting changes. The Roe v. Wade decision in 1973 gave women in states that failed to give them the right to control their lives. The decision was the most important legal change for equal women's rights. The steps toward personal freedom will continue as the female baby boomers become mature adults and are followed by their children. Today Dobbs v. Jackson may inspire woman's political energy.

There are times when one of our members is dealing with an illness, a loss, or another personal crisis.



CURRENT ACHIEVEMENTS

Recently the hot news has been full of achievements from which artificial intelligence is able to create works of art and write articles and reports with very little effort on our part. A professor from Princeton University said a paper written by ChatGPT would have passed at Princeton. Amazon's latest robot arm, called Sparrow, can pick up a varied list of objects in their warehouse and place them in a box. In a pizza restaurant robots made 100 pizzas to order. New cars are partly made by computerized robots, have no keys and touch screen computers. Improved safety features include automatic braking when necessary, provision of directions and adjustment for traffic problems.

When I tried to visit ChatGPT online, the site was full. The notification I was given was in the form of the following ode written by ChatGPT in the style of Shakespere. "Explain the status of CHATGPT in the style of Shakespeare."

"Ah, dear user of ChatGPT, thou art not alone in thy desire to engage with our esteemed Al chatbot. Many have flocked to our website in this hour, and we do our utmost to accommodate each and every one. Yet, alas, our resources are not without limit and we must ask for thy patience and forbearance. In time, we shall be able to provide thee with access to ChatGPT. Until then, we beg thee to return at a future juncture."

The ChatGPT (Chat Generative Pre-trained Transformer) debut was met with some positive reviews. Kevin Roose of The New York Times said it was the "best artificial intelligence chatbox ever released to the general public". Samantha Lock of the Guardian newspaper noted that it was able to generate "impressively detailed" and "human like" text. Technology writer Dan Gillmor used Chat GPT for a student assignment and found its generated text was on a par with what a good student would deliver. He wrote "Academia has some very serious issues to confront." In The Atlantic Magazine's "Breakthroughs of the Year for 2022, Derek Thomson included Chat GPT as part of "the generative AI eruption that may change our mind about how we work, how we think, and what human creativity really is." The Open AI CEO, Sam Altman, was quoted in The New York Times stating AI's "benefits for human kind could be so unbelievably good that it's hard for me to even imagine."

As reported in The New York Times, two months after ChatGPT's debut, the site has had more than 30 million users and receives about five million visits a day. As a comparison Instagram reached only ten million users after a year. The company, Open AI, has now announced it would start selling a \$20 monthly subscription. Mr. Altman has also signed a \$10 billion dollar deal with Microsoft. He has also met with top executives of Apple and Google. Open AI is also entering into a deal with BuzzFeed to use its technology to create A.I. generated lists and quizzes. The announcement more than doubled BuzzFeed's stock price. Mr. Altman met with lawmakers in Washington, explaining the tool's strengths and weaknesses and hoping to clear up misconceptions about how it works.

As women we have the responsibility to learn about and utilize new achievements and to encourage our daughters to study STEM courses and new career opportunities. We must stay current to expect equal opportunity and equal pay.

In April the Membership will vote on the 2023-2024 Budget, the incoming Board of Directors, and the acceptance of the dues change for 2023-2024.

AAUW National is again raising our yearly dues by five dollars, bringing the total National dues to \$72. New York State dues will remain the same at \$7. Our branch dues will also remain the same at \$29. As a result, we have had to raise your total membership dues by five dollars to \$108.

Attached is the budget for 2023-2024. Our calendar year runs from July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024. When you review the budget, you will notice that we are projected to operate at a deficit, as we have done for the past few years. In order to minimize this deficit, the Board voted to include an option to allow our members to make an additional donation when they renew their annual membership. We hope you will consider adding a donation to your dues. The dues renewal form will include the option of making an additional donation to support the 8th Grade Educational awards, the Senior High School Educational awards, and/or the branch operating funds.
