She holds a Master of Arts in Nursing Administration and Nursing Education, as well as a PhD in Nursing Theory and Research Development from New York University and is an inaugural graduate of the Coldiron Senior Nurses Executive Fellowship Program at Case Western Reserve University. Dr. Brennan holds dual board certification in Adult Medical Surgical Nursing and Nursing Administration-Advanced from the American Nurses Credentialing Center. She serves on the Board of Directors for Nurses Houses, NYU Nursing Alumni Association, Northeast Multistate Division, and the Pleasantville Community Scholarship Fund. Dr. Brennan is active in many professional organizations and is the elected state treasurer and Executive Board member for the New York State Organization of Nurse Executives and Leaders. She is a member of Sigma Theta Tau Nursing Honor Society, American Organization of Nurse Leaders, American Nurses Association, New York State Nurses Association, and the Center for Nursing Research.

## 2023 EQUAL PAY DAYS -by Selena Barron



March 14th was Equal Pay Day 2023. This is not a holiday to be celebrated! Each year AAUW publishes the date that the average woman who works full time has to work to reach what the average man who works full time will earn by January 31st. The data is based on the latest U.S. Census figures which show that the average woman who works full time is paid on average just 84 percent of the average man's pay. For all workers including those who work part time or seasonal the gap is 77 percent.

In1996 the National Committee on Pay Equity (NCPE) began to publicize the data to raise awareness about the gender wage gap. Other Equal Pay Days, Listed below on our national AAUW website are other Equal Pay DAYS that have now been added to more accurately describe how the pay gap varies by different groups, especially women of color.

Asian American, Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander Women's Equal Pay Day is April 5th. Women working full time, year around, are paid 92 cents and all earners, including part time and seasonal, are paid 80 cents for every dollar paid to non-hispanic white men.

**LGBTQIA+ Equal Pay Day** is June 15th. Without enough data to make calculations, this day raises awareness about the wage gap experienced by LGBTQIA+ folks.

**Black Women's Equal Pay Day** is July 27th. Black women working full time year round are paid 67 cents and all earners, including part time and seasonal, are paid 64 cents for every dollar paid to non-Hispanic white men.

**Mom's Equal Pay Day** is August 15th. Moms working full time, year around, are paid 74 cents and all earners, including part time and seasonal, are paid 62 cents for every dollar paid to dads.

Latina's Equal Pay Day is October 5th. Latina's women working full time, year round, are paid 57 cents and all earners, including part time and seasonal, are paid 54 cents for every dollar paid to non-hispanic white men.

**Native Women's Equal Pay Day** is November 30th. Native women working full time, year round are paid 57 cents and all earners, including part time and seasonal, are paid 51 cents for every dollar paid to non Hispanic white men.

There are other ways that women are discriminated against. Women are especially hurt by what is called "the motherhood penalty". The Pregnancy Discrimination Act (PDA) prohibits discrimination in all aspects of employment, including hiring, firing, promotion, pay and other employment benefits. However, unlike the majority of developed countries worldwide, the United States does not guarantee paid annual leave, paid time off for illness or family care or paid parental leave.

Even nine year old girls understand that gender discrimination is wrong and on March 26th in a full Opinion Page in the NY Times, Michela M. wrote: "I believe that girls should get paid as much as boys do in jobs. I don't know why they're not, but it's not right. Just because we're girls doesn't mean we don't work hard enough! Girls can do everything boys can do and more. Not getting paid the same amount is just wrong."

AAUW is a strong advocate for equal opportunity and equal pay for all women. They offer many programs to help women achieve these goals including: Work Smart & Smart Salary Negotiation, Boost Your Career, Fellowships & Grants, Women's Economic Empowerment Initiative, The Legal Advocacy Fund, and AAUW Webinars.
