Scott Craven is co-author of Croton Point Park: Westchester's Jewel on the Hudson (2022) and a frequent speaker about wildlife and human impact on the environment. As the former Historian of the Town of Ossining and an avid fisherman, paddler and cyclist, he knows our area better than most. Over the years he has connected with many people whose passion and expertise regarding different aspects of the Hudson River Valley have helped us weave its history into a compelling story. He will discuss our unique environmental and cultural history and how these have shaped our human experience while we also influence the nature of the Hudson Valley.

Scott is a retired Ossining Police captain and currently works at the Ossining Public Library. He is a graduate of Pace University and has a Masters in American History from Western Connecticut State University. His Master's thesis focused on an environmental history of the geographically and culturally rich area along the Hudson River.

If you are new to the branch's local scholarship project, let me fill you in. It was established around 1992 and makes a small difference to some women students at Westchester Community College (WCC), and is in keeping with our mission to advance gender equity through education. During the year and especially at the scholarship luncheon, individual branch members donate to raise money for two or three scholarships. The recipients must maintain a GPA of 3.0 or higher and demonstrate leadership qualities and concern for women's issues.

The winners of the AAUW scholarships are invited to our Spring Fling dinner in June. They are asked to deliver a short speech telling us about their background and aspirations. We have always been impressed by their stories and their erudition.

New this year, because of WCC's wish to streamline the scholarship process at the college, and to ease our ability to reach the awardees, scholarships will be given to students in their second year instead of to graduates. Donations will be payable to our branch (AAUW-Westchester) instead of to WCC Foundation. I will collect the checks and pass them on to our treasurer who will send the donations to WCC in a lump sum two or three times a year.

I hope you will join us at this year's luncheon at **11:30 a.m. on Thursday, April 13**, in the Viking Café, elegantly prepared by students in the Culinary Arts and Hospitality Management Department.

NOMEN'S VOICES FOR WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH

March is Women's History Month and I believe that there is no better way of understanding its importance and honoring women today than by sharing the following voices of today's generation of women.

Carren Morris, President of PENSOLE, Inc.

"It is imperative to understand how women before us created their journey that has allowed us to be where we are today. Women's History Month is about honoring the past and creating history."

Jamie Ellis, Soles4Souls Vice President, Marketing and Communications

"Think about it, it wasn't that many generations before ours where women couldn't do so many things that we could easily take for granted if we didn't take the time to reflect. We certainly have a long way to go, but it's important to reflect and celebrate how we got here."

Wells Fargo highlighted the following three women, in leadership positions at Wells Fargo, in a full page, in color ad, in the N.Y. Times:

Eugenia Kristina Draper is the Head of Consumer Technology Platform Services. She is a first generation Hispanic who didn't learn English until she went to school in the U.S. She praises her opportunity to learn from peers and managers. She says "By challenging me, giving me room to rise and equal room to make mistakes, these relationships have shaped me into the leader I am today."

Tangela Richter is the Executive Vice President, Deputy General Counsel & Corporate Secretary. She says "As a leader, I strive to create an environment where everyone knows that their voice is valued, and everyone feels like they belong no matter their background." "I was the first in my family to graduate from college, and my parents encouraged me to not be afraid to take a stand, take up space and to make sure that my voice is heard." "Leadership isn't about your title. It's about having a voice and taking a stand."

Muneera Carr is the Executive President & Chief Accounting Officer. She says "as a first-generation immigrant, I started out working in minimum-wage jobs." "Not in my wildest dreams did I expect my journey to result in me leading a global team. It wasn't easy, but I hope my story shows that anything is possible. My goal is to make a difference, and my current role puts me in a unique position to make active change. For those with similar stories, know that you do belong, your efforts matter, your views are respected and you can find success."

Aramco honored women and praised their importance to the company in a full page ad in Scientific America. The CEO said "Women continue to be underrepresented in fields such as science, technology, engineering and math. This reality inspired a series of initiatives designed to accelerate women's professional development within our operations. This approach has produced an outcome which signals a more promising future; Aramco's growing cohort of female researchers have been named as inventors on 352 U.S.patents and counting."

When asked for her view of History Month:

Sephanie Whitmore, the Soles4Souls Senior Director of Business Development, Footwear Companies said "Women's History Month is important to me because it highlights all the amazing things that women have accomplished over the years and how women are evolving and making strides. It showcases how far we have come as a society with recognizing the value that women bring to the table.
