## SPEAKER George Latimer, Westchester County Executive PROGRAM

## The Importance of Women & Girls in Government

Westchester County Executive George Latimer will speak on the importance of women in government and community action, and encouraging girls and young women to become involved in government at all levels.

George Latimer (he/him/his), a third generation Westchester native, was born in Mount Vernon, attended Mount Vernon public schools, and graduated with a B.A. from Fordham University in the Bronx in 1974, and a Master's Degree in Public Administration from NYU's Wagner School in 1976. A resident of the City of Rye for over 35 years, Latimer ran his first successful race for public office in 1987, earning him a seat on the Rye City Council. Four years later, in 1991, he was elected to the Westchester County Board of Legislators, where he became the first-ever Democrat to win the 7th District. During the 13 years Latimer was a member of the chamber, he served as Minority Leader and then as the first Democratic Chairman of



the Board of Legislators in Westchester County history. Elected in 2004 to the State Assembly, and was then elected to the State Senate in November 2012, representing the 37th District comprised of 16 Westchester municipalities. Latimer took office as Westchester County Executive in January 2018 as the ninth County Executive. He was then re-elected to a second term as County Executive in November 2021, never losing an election after over three decades in public office.

### WOMEN REACHING THE TOP IN SPORTS Submitted by Selena Barron

With a 2-6. 6-3, 6-2 win over No. 1, Aujla Sablenka, 19 year old American tennis player Cocoa Gauff won the U.S. Open women's single final. The Grand Slam title comes with a \$3 million winner's check which is equal to the men's winner payout. This year The U.S. Open celebrated 50 years of equal pay for men and women. Corporations are also very aware of the pressure for them to spend equal or almost equal dollars with their sponsorship dollars. With this new payout Gauff's prize money will come to \$5.6 million this year. Over her five year pro career Gauff has made an estimated \$12 million from endorsements, appearance fees and other business endeavors (before taxes and agent fees). She is now NO. 7 on Forbes list of the highest paid players. After this win she will surely earn more as she has reached a new high in her career.

Here in Westchester The Pace University lacrosse team, The Setters, became the NCAA Division II National Champions for 2023. Kayla Conway was voted the Northeast Conference Scholar athlete of the year for the 2022-2023 season. She finished this spring with a 3.88 GPA. The NEIO Midfielder of the year was also named MVP of the NCAA tournament as the Setters won their first ever NCAA Division II Women's Lacrosse Championship. The Intercollegiate Women's Lacrosse Coaches Association (IWLCA) announced Pace Women's Lacrosse Program as one of 290 schools across Division i,II,III and NALA as an IWLCA Academic Honor Squad for 2022-2023. To qualify for the honor, the women's lacrosse team must have posted a 3.2 or higher team GPA.

The team was invited to join college athletes across the country at the White House to celebrate the team's NCAA National Championship. The Setters joined 47 teams representing 19 sports from NCAA division's national winners. They were all congratulated on the South Lawn as part of College Athlete Day.

Vice President Kamala Harris told the crowd "You made tremendous sacrifices, training through injuries, birthdays, vacations and even a pandemic. You know, all of you, what it means to commit and persevere. And we know that so often during the course of a long season, sports teams also become a family. You develop life-long relationships. You demonstrate teamwork and character. You make the people around you better in every way. You are leaders. You are role models, and, of course, you are champions"
