Every year the AAUW Board adopts a mission statement for our programs and for our organization. This year our theme is "Westchester Women Envisioning the Future." There is much taking place within our organization as we move toward the future.



We also made a difference by working for and passing the PROP ONE amendment. Senator Shelley Mayer (cont'd on next page...) spoke to us about the importance of this; and we wrote postcards, spoke to neighbors, and reminded voters waiting in line outside polling places to Flip the Ballot. This important Amendment guarantees reproductive freedom in New York, protects against discrimination by the government, based, among other things, on age, national origin, disability, and sexual orientation.

We look forward to seeing many of you at the annual Holiday Lunch on December 4 at the Kittle House. Do remember to send a contribution to the toy drive, which allows us as Westchester Women to envision a better future for many children.

A New York Drought by Selena Barron

According to the National Weather Service, October usually brings about 4.4 inches of rain to New York City. The City uses an average of 1.1 billion gallons daily. This enormous-sounding usage is actually 35 per cent less than it was in 1979, partly due to more effective leak detection. However, despite this, we are experiencing the second longest dry spell in the City's recorded history.

Rohit Aggarwala, the City's Department of Environmental Protection Commissioner, announced that October was the driest 150 years and the area was being placed under a drought watch. A drought watch is the first of four levels of water scarcity, which escalates in severity to a drought warning, a drought emergency and finally to a drought disaster. For a drought watch there are no emergency restrictions, DEC officials said. The New York counties now under a drought watch are Bronx, Delaware, Dutchess, Greene, Kings, New York, Orange, Putnam, Queens, Richmond, Rockland, Schoharie, Sullivan, Ulster, and Westchester.

Managing water resources has been made more difficult by the repair of a large, leaking aqueduct that transports water to the City from the Catskill region. This problem has caused residents to rely on reservoirs from the northern suburbs.

Mayor Adams said, "Mother Nature is in charge, so we must adapt." He encouraged New Yorkers to utilize less water and also directed city agencies to prepare to implement water-saving measures. City and State officials issued a list of some examples of how to conserve water. Suggestions that could be used by all New Yorkers are listed below:

Fix leaking pipes and faucets
Take shorter showers
Don't run the water while brushing your teeth
Report street leaks and open hydrants
Run the dishwasher only when full
Use the washing machine and dryer only for full loads

Every little bit helps!


