APRIL CO-PRESIDENTS' MESSAGE

"Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world; it's the only thing that ever has." This is a quote from anthropologist Margaret Mead, and it has signficant importance today.

Many of us watch the changes being made in our government and country and feel anger, fear, and disconnectedness. Are there actions we can take? Are there things that we can do? AAUW weighs in on many

different policies and has positions on economic security, civil rights, and education. For each, there is a suggestion on how each of us can make a difference. A few of these are listed below:

- Call or write a letter to our congressional representatives to protect students from cuts to Pell Grants.
- Call or write a letter to Congress leadership on protecting and preserving public access to federal data.
- Call or write a letter to President Trump opposing the executive order targeting transgender, nonbinary and intersex indviduals.
- Call or write a letter to Congress urging support and investment in caregiving work.
- Call or write a letter to congress opposing the ban on transgender, intersex and non-binary youth from school sports.

It is also important to examine women in leadership roles. This is an important topic for AAUW as well as for our local organization. Women have made many gains in leadership, and yet there are still many barriers. The wage gap is certainly one. According to the US Census Bureau, for every dollar a man earns, a woman makes only 80 cents. One main reason for this is that women are often balancing careers with caregiving duties. This makes it hard for many to succeed.

There are many other factors that continue to make it hard for women to achieve leadership in politics, academia, and business. A major one is that women have fewer connections or networks in these areas with people who can serve as sponsors or mentors to champion their advancement. Sexual harrassment and hostile work environments are still obstacles for women as they look to pursue opportunities in these areas. It is also difficult for many to balance work and family challenges that keep them from attaining leadership roles.

Our organization is sponsoring many programs to help young women be successful in these areas. On April 22 we will take part in the scholarship luncheon at WCC.

International Women's Day 2025

International Women's Day (IWD) took place on March 8, during the U.S. Women's History Month. The campaign theme this year is Accelerate Action. This theme, expressing urgency, is based on a number of issues that women continue to face.
