Tarrifs are high, prices are high and the cost of so many items we purchase is getting higher and higher. In addition, book banning continues, immigrants are being wrongfully removed from our country, and LGBT as well as many other people of color are under attack.

There have been executive orders threatening diversity, equity and inclusion. These can adversely impact women and marginalized communities. If that is not enough, we worry about Medicaid, Medicare, and Social Security, and the world we will be leaving our children and grandchildren, nieces and nephews.

What can we do and how do we cope with all of this? Cory Booker did demonstrate the importance of taking a stand with his recent groundbreaking Senate speech. We can also take a stand. There is a practice requiring health care providers to report whenever a woman seeks an abortion. This is very invasive, requiring patients to share private information about themselves. We can continue to contact our elected representatives in Albany and Washington about all the issues that concern us, letting them know what is important to us and how we want them to vote. When we take a stand, it empowers us and gives us the knowledge that we are doing our part to repair our country and the world. This is clearly one of the goals and missions of AAUW.







As a result of conflict and war, priceless works of art and important political, religious, and societal history are often lost or destroyed. I recently read an article about women who have taken on the responsibility of restoring and preserving art and history damaged or lost due to war and conflict. I believe their stories should be told and honored. Here are the stories of several of these women.

Irina Bokova, the first woman to lead UNESCO, gave priority to protecting and restoring cultural heritage in war-torn regions. She started the "United4Heritage" campaign in order to raise global awareness about safeguarding cultural treasures. Under her leadership, UNESCO worked to restore ancient sites like Timbuktu's manuscripts and Palmyra's ruins.


Monica Hanna, an Egyptian archaeologist, is a fierce advocate for protecting Egypt's ancient artifacts from looting and illegal trade. She has worked tirelessly to recover stolen artifacts. Her efforts highlight the connection between cultural heritage and national identity.

Azra Aksamija, an artist and architect from Bosnia, uses her artistic talents to protect cultural heritage in post conflict areas. Her projects include designing memorials and creating spaces that reflect the histories of affected communities. Her work bridges the gap between preservation and innovation. Azra inspires resilience and creativity in rebuilding after conflict and devastation.

Italian art historian Francesca Cappelletti has played a vital role in restoring art works stolen or damaged during World War II. Once they are restored, the works of art are returned to their rightful places. Francesca also trains the next generation of conservationists so that Italy's cultural legacy will be preserved for future generations.

Through the use of their skills and efforts in restoring these symbols of identity and culture, these women have ensured that their cultural history is meaningful, important, and will not be forgotten.
