This very apt quote can be applied to many of the issues that our State Public Policy Committee and State Board are tackling. The focus of our


state organization, as well as that of our local branch, is to to work towards economic security, education, and advocacy for women.

Last year our State Public Policy Committee looked into the issue of book banning, which we are monitoring because it continues to occur throughout New York and most other states. There are attempts in our state to limit access to school library materals and books on the basis of their content and the identity of their authors. Many of our school and public libraries, happily, are utilizing certified media specialists to suggest and support materials that align with curriculum, diversity of populations, and differentiated needs and abilities of student populations.

Also of concern in New York State is human trafficking. There have been times when young girls have been drugged, placed in vans, and taken to Canada and other countries. Some in our state are designing stickers to be placed in restrooms which will tell women where to go for safety or to obtain information if they feel they or someone they know might be in danger. AAUW has always stood for human rights and justice. Human trafficking is clearly a violation of this core principle.

Title IX of the Education Amendments is a federal civil rights law prohibiting sex-based discrimination in any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance. It applies to academics and athletics and protects students from sexual harrassment and violence. We know that Title IX is under attack at this time. Our State Public Policy Committee is monitoring this and is concerned about the impact that attacks on Title IX might have on our students.

Our state organization will be offering a program next spring on "Being a Financially Savvy Woman". Many of us lack expertise on how to handle finances. Many of us worry that our money may not last for us. We worry about how to make smart financial investments. This seminar will answer these questions and many more. Detailed information will be forthcoming.
